For thousands of years people have used symbols on signet rings to express and communicate the things that mean the most to them, creating symbols for identification, love, friendship, affiliation, promise, rebellion. They all serve as personal statements and are often striking and surprising.

The use of heraldry as a theme emerged during the Middle Ages, mainly from the military as a means of identification. When wearing suits of armour and closed helmets on the battle and tournament field, the need for a quick, visual way to identify each other became a matter of survival. Today signet rings bearing family crests or symbols are fascinating, not only for their aesthetic appeal but also for the great amount of information they contain. It is our link to an ancient past and a symbol of pride in continuing family heritage. Although they occur in many cultures, they are united in that they are all 'works of art' in miniature, exquisite form. They are jewels within their own right.

Our methods are steeped in the rich traditions of the rings themselves and we will only use traditional hand-engraving tools to carve your family crest, monogram or any design you care to supply.






2. Create your design

Once you have decided on your ring style, you now have a blank canvas that you can personalise and bring to life. You can supply your own design or choose a design from our online family crest and monogram database, to be hand engraved onto your signet ring. Whether you would like to see how your design will look on the ring, or work with us to create something meaningful, our artists can create beautiful, hand drawn sketches. Our craftsmen will then use traditional hand held tools to carve the design into your signet ring.

SIGNET RINGS IN HISTORY

Signet rings have been symbols of power, prestige and heritage since the earliest days of civilisation. For thousands of years, they have served many important roles in the societies of which they were created. The earliest recorded use of a signet ring dates back to ancient Egypt, where rings adorned with hieroglyphics were discovered among the riches and finery of pharaohs' tombs. As this period predated traditional writing, it is understood that these rings were also used for identification during business transactions instead of signatures.



Signet rings were also a vital component of Greek and Roman culture. Decorated warriors, emperors and noblemen wore signet rings which were often adorned with images of Greek and Roman gods, pagan symbols and creatures from mythology. The wearing of a coat of arms began to develop in the 1100's. During this time, a system of designing images and symbols were initially drawn onto the outer coat of a soldier's clothing, and became known as a 'coat of arms', enabling him to be identified quickly as a friend or foe on the battlefield. As the practice grew, the process of granting and designing of arms became formalised in the tradition known as heraldry.

In contemporary culture, although signets are still worn as a part of familial traditions, they are also for aesthetic purposes, to express and communicate the things that mean the most to us, creating symbols for identification, love, friendship, affiliation, promise, rebellion. They all serve as personal statements and are often striking and surprising.



Jim & Sofia's Story

"When I first met Sofia, we were sitting on the roof terrace of a pub in Brighton with lots of friends; I was asking her about a bangle she was wearing that had an engraving on it. Sofia studied poetry at University and the engraving was the first line of a poem by GM Hopkins -"As kingfishers catch fire, dragonflies draw flame". To be honest, I had no idea what it meant, but I just thought that sentence had a beautiful rhythm to it. It really stuck with me. A couple of years later, when I was thinking about proposing, I did some research into it and loved the idea that the first few lines of the poem describe creatures and objects that are different, but bound by something totally out their control. I don't think it was Hopkins' intention, but isn't that just a beautiful metaphor for love? So,

when caught in the sunlight, a kingfisher's plumage appears to catch fire much like a dragonfly's iridescent wings do. When it came to getting a ring to propose with it seemed to make sense to get one each, one with a kingfisher engraved and the other with a dragonfly. She said yes, and we've barely taken them off since!




John's Story


HOW TO WEAR YOUR SIGNET RING

We're often asked about the 'rules' of wearing your signet ring and we find that opinions vary widely. This is because signet rings are very much steeped in tradition, yet their identity and purpose evolves as fashions change across the centuries.

However, there are traditions across the world and one or more of them might appeal to you. In the UK, the signet ring is traditionally worn on the little finger on the non-dominant hand. In Switzerland, men wear signet rings on the right finger of their right hand, while in France men use the right finger of their left hand. In the United States, it's quite normal to see people wearing a signet ring on their ring or middle finger – for example, Steve McQueen. Winston Churchill defied tradition by wearing his gold signet ring, bearing the family crest, on his third ring finger. Prince Charles wears his wedding ring on his little finger, stacked next to his signet ring.

In the Middle Ages, the little finger was favored for a signet ring. This ensured that the wearer was easily able to use the ring for its traditional purpose – as a tool to emboss a wax-seal. During the seventeenth century, the signet ring briefly fell out of fashion. Instead, prominent members of society preferred to have their seal in an ornamental mount worn on a chain or ribbon, along with a watch. This continued until the latter part of the eighteenth century, when the signet ring became popular again.

Ultimately, as the signet ring becomes a means of personal expression, where and how it's worn will be as unique as the person who wears it.





SURFACE ENGRAVING

As with seal engraving, surface engraving is undertaken by hand, using hand held gravers that are pushed through the metal. It is the same technique used by the traditional bank note engravers, but unlike seal engraving, we do not carve deep into the metal, we engrave the design by cutting hundreds of lines of varying widths and depths until the design comes to life.

SEAL ENGRAVING

For signet rings, seal engraving the design is the most popular method. We create your crest, monogram or motif by carving deeply into the signet ring, hand engraving the design in reverse. Once the seal engraving is completed we then use the ring to produce a 3D wax impression, the seal.



PACKAGING

Your ring will arrive presented in a gift box with an encapsulated wax impression of your design, along with a wax taper so that you can make your own wax seals at home.

Be sure to keep this safe, as it is an excellent artwork reference, in case you or future generations would like to have another Rebus ring created.



HALLMARKS

Each precious metal signet ring is independently tested at the London Assay Office and comes with feature hallmarks under the face of the ring; this is your guarantee of the precious metal content through the practise of third party independent hallmarking.
